

#### Key Takeaways


- Governor's Budget submitted out of balance by \$37m, ongoing structural issues
- Budget deficit increases to \$3.6 billion in out years
- Primary focus of initiatives on tax cuts and education
- Capital budget funded at \$1.1b, no room for additional projects
- \$2.6 million for 25 new prosecutors and support staff for the Attorney General in Baltimore City



#### General Fund Outlook – Structural Deficit Forecast Fiscal 2021-2025 (\$ in Millions)









# 2020 Health Policy Priority: Healthcare Consumer Protections



### Controlling Healthcare Costs

- Stop Medical Debt Lawsuits HB 1420
  - Expand access to financial assistance for hospital bills
  - Require hospitals to explain and offer help before suing
- Transparent Billing for Outpatient Visits HB 915
  - Require hospitals to reveal hidden charges called "facility fees" before you make an appointment
- Affordable Insurance for Small Business HB 930
  - Create a \$17 million dollar fund to help businesses support workers' health insurance premiums

#### Health, Mobility & Livability

- **Expand Health Care in Schools HB 497** 
  - Enable Physician Assistants to work in school-based clinics
- Improve Bus Service HB 1492
  - Protect Dedicated Bus Lanes
  - Make transit system better serve students & workers
- Livability
  - Risk from Crashes HB 1324
    - Protect the most vulnerable from pedestrian injury & death
  - Complete Streets Funding HB 107
    - Pay for safer intersections, wider sidewalks, lighting for pedestrian safety using speed/traffic camera revenues







Exhibit 5. Share of FY 2020-2023 TIP Funding by Project Category






- MSP to do traffic enforcement on the JFX and BW Parkway
- Require improved law enforcement coordination
- Increase monitoring of the Port of Baltimore for guns and illegal drugs
- Teams focused on violent offenders and support for high need neighborhoods
- VIPP funding for Roca and Safe Streets
